30. SUBJECT-VERB AGREEMENT: BASIC RULES

To make sure the verb agrees with the subject:

- First, find the subject(s) of the sentence. The subject is who or what is performing the action or being described.
 - □ <u>Nurses</u> prepare the patients for surgery, and <u>the head nurse</u> inspects the patients' rights before the surgery.
 - □ <u>*The topic*</u> is controversial, so <u>the students</u> have strong opinions.
 - □ <u>*I*</u>*am studying biology because* <u>*it*</u> *has always interested me.*
- Then, look for these three types of verbs to make sure the verb agrees with the subject.
 - □ Verbs in the simple present □ *BE* verbs □ *HAVE* verbs

	How to make the verb agree with the subject	Example of subject-verb agreement	Remember
	If the subject is any noun that can be replaced with he , she , or it , add $-s$ to the simple form of the verb.	The head <u>nurse</u> <u>inspects</u> the patients.	The – <i>s</i> at the end of a verb means third person singular (e.g., <i>she inspects</i>).
Verbs in the simple present	If the subject is any noun that can be replaced with <i>they</i> (or is the pronouns <i>I</i> , <i>we</i> , <i>you</i> or <i>they</i>), just use the simple form.	<u><i>I</i>/you/we/they inspect</u> the patients.	The –s at the end of a noun means plural (e.g., <i>patient<u>s</u></i>).
<i>BE</i> verbs	<i>BE</i> verbs can be used alone.	<u>I am</u> a nursing major. <u>The topic is</u> controversial. <u>You / We / /They are</u> helpful.	Used alone or as a helping verb, the <i>BE</i> verb needs to agree with the subject.
	<i>BE</i> verbs can be helping verbs.	<u>I am</u> studying biology. <u>My friend is</u> studying biology. <u>You / We</u> / <u>They are</u> studying biology.	
HAVE verbs	<i>HAVE</i> verbs can be used alone.	<u>I / You / We / They have</u> strong opinions. <u>The school has</u> helpful teachers.	Used alone or as a helping verb, the <i>HAVE</i> verb needs to agree with the subject.
	HAVE verbs can be used as helping verbs.	<u>I/You/We/They have</u> studied already. <u>It has</u> always interested me.
