





34. SIMPLE PAST TENSE (*It caused...*) vs. PAST PROGRESSIVE TENSE (*It was causing...*)

	FUNCTION	EXAMPLES	FORM
THE SIMPLE PAST TENSE	To describe an action or an event that was completed at a particular time in the past (e.g., in <i>2005, yesterday, last month, two days ago</i>).	 <p><i>I <u>graduated</u> high school in 2005.</i></p>	Simple form + <i>ed</i>
THE PAST PROGRESSIVE TENSE	To describe an action or event that was in progress at a certain time in the past.	 <p><i>The senator <u>was making</u> a speech when protestors stood up and interrupted him.</i></p>  <p><i>At 6 p.m. on Election Day, voters <u>were</u> still <u>standing</u> in lines outside polling stations.</i></p>	<i>was / were + simple form + ing</i>
	To describe two events that were happening at the same time in the past.	 <p><i>While the professor <u>was lecturing</u>, the students were <u>taking notes</u>. (Both actions – the professor lecturing and the students taking notes – were in progress at the same time.)</i></p>
