44. PARALLEL STRUCTURE

One way to make sentences easier to follow is to use the same form for lists and comparisons. This means using the same grammatical structure:

- adjectives with adjectives
- infinitives with infinitives
- gerunds (nouns ending in -ing) with gerunds

Here are examples of sentences that lack parallel structure and how to fix them:

NOT PARALLEL	PARALLEL
The proposal to develop the waterfront is <u>economical</u> and has <u>benefits</u> . (adjective and clause)	The proposal to develop the waterfront is <u>economical</u> and <u>beneficial</u> . (adjectives)
The performer is <u>beautiful</u> , <u>young</u> , and a <u>talented violinist</u> . (adjectives and noun phrase)	The performer is a <u>beautiful young woman</u> and a <u>talented</u> <u>violinist</u> . (noun phrases)
She has played with <u>European</u> orchestras and in <u>Asia.</u> (adjective and prepositional phrase)	She has played with <u>European</u> and <u>Asian</u> orchestras. (adjectives) OR She has played with orchestras <u>in Europe</u> and <u>in Asia.</u> (prepositional phrases)
Checking grammar is important for writing essays, and also to write resumes. (gerund and infinitive)	Checking grammar is important for writing essays, and also for writing resumes. (gerunds)

Parallel structure is especially useful for lists.
