Grammar Explanation

Avoiding double negatives

- Use only one negative in a clause. Using more than one negative in a single sentence is incorrect.
 - o Incorrect: Joe will **not** get **no** parole before serving at least ten years.
 - o Corrected: Joe will **not** get parole before serving at least ten years.
- Pronouns such as nobody, no one, none, nothing are negative. Do not use them with no
 or not.
 - o Incorrect: The defendant has **not** done **nothing** illegal.
 - o Corrected: The defendant has not done anything illegal.
- Never and neither have negative meanings. Do not use them with no or not.
 - o Incorrect: Mr. Myers doesn't agree with the proposal neither.
 - o Corrected: Mr. Myers doesn't agree with the proposal either.
- Words such as barely, scarcely, hardly are considered negative. Do not use them with no or not.
 - o Incorrect: The politicians **don't hardly** understand what caused the sudden shift in public opinion.
 - o Corrected: The politicians **hardly** understand what caused the sudden shift in public opinion.
