## Choosing the right verb in conditional sentences

- When if is used to introduce a dependent clause, the sentence is called a conditional sentence. Unreal conditional sentences express unreal or imaginary situations, while future possible conditionals are used to predict what will happen in the future under certain circumstances.
- In unreal conditionals, the verb in the dependent clause (*if*-clause) is in the past tense, and in the independent clause (result clause) *would* + *the base* form of the verb is used.
  - Example: If I had a million dollars, I would donate a portion of it to my university.
- In the unreal conditional, were is used in the if-clause even with I, he, she and it.
  - o Example: If I were president, I would support universal health care.
- In future possible conditionals, the verb in the *if-clause* is in the present tense, and
  the verb in the *result clause* is in the future tense.
  - o Example: If I have time after finishing my homework tonight, I will call you.
