## 33. SIMPLE PRESENT (It causes...) vs. PRESENT CONTINUOUS (It is causing...)

## Five situations where you use the simple present tense:

FUNCTION	EXAMPLES	
	X X X X X X now	
To express <b>routine</b> , <b>habit</b> , and <b>frequent events</b> (that happen regularly over time)	Routine/Pattern: Whenever unemployment <u>is</u> high, the crime rate <u>rises</u> . Habit: Most cigarette smokers <u>feel</u> the urge to smoke after a meal. Frequent event: The train usually <u>runs</u> late on weekends due to repairs.	
To express a <b>fact</b>	<b>Fact:</b> The earth <u>rotates</u> on its axis once every twenty four hours.	
To summarize the plot of a movie, short story, play or novel	In the movie "Invasion of the Body Snatchers,", strange creatures <u>come</u> to earth from a distant planet. In the end, they <u>take</u> over the government.	
	X (scheduled event)	
To talk about an event scheduled in the future	Registration <u>begins</u> at 9 a.m. tomorrow and <u>ends</u> at 5 p.m. the day after.	
To complete a time clause	I will go to bed after I <u>finish</u> my homework.	

## Three situations where you use the present continuous tense (be + simple form + ing):

FUNCTION	EXAMPLES
To talk about something that is happening right now	Now What <u>are you doing</u> ? I <u>am studying f</u> or a calculus test.
To talk about something taking place over a period of time in the present (extended present)	X   now   Global population is growing at a rapid pace.
To talk about a planned event in the future	X (planned event)
To talk about a planned event in the future.	<i>The committee is holding a meeting next week.</i>

## Note: Only use the present continuous with action verbs.

Using the present continuous with a state verb (e.g., know) is almost always incorrect.

**Incorrect:** The government <u>is knowing</u> the situation well.

**Correct:** *The government* <u>*knows*</u> *the situation well.*
