

41. WORD ORDER: COMMON PROBLEMS

(Indirect questions and adjectives clauses that are not next to the noun they modify)

INDIRECT QUESTIONS

English has two kinds of questions:

- **Direct questions** – when someone asks someone else a question (*The Senator asked the President, “When will the war end?”*)
- **Indirect questions** – when you report a question that somebody else asked (*The Senator asked the President when the war would end.*)

In an **indirect question**, the **subject comes before the verb**.

EXAMPLES OF WORD ORDER FOR INDIRECT QUESTIONS	THE RULES
<p>Correct: Joe asked Phil who <u>the 40th president of the U.S</u> <u>was</u>.</p> <p>Incorrect: Joe asked Phil who <u>was</u> <u>the 40th president of the U.S</u>.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ■ In a direct question, the verb comes before the subject, but in an indirect question, the subject comes before the verb. ■ Do not put the verb before the subject in an indirect question.
<p>Correct: A woman asked the senator why <u>he supported</u> a higher tax on the middle class.</p> <p>Incorrect: A woman asked the senator why <u>did he support</u> a higher tax on the middle class?</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ■ Do not use the helping verbs <i>do, does, did</i> in indirect questions. ■ Do not use a question mark at the end of an indirect question. Use a period.

ADJECTIVE CLAUSES

An adjective clause is a group of words that has the same function as an adjective: modifying (describing) a noun.

Example: *The city is trying to develop a public transportation system that is affordable and effective.*

An **adjective clause must come after the word that it modifies**, and nowhere else.

EXAMPLES OF WORD ORDER FOR ADJECTIVE CLAUSES	THE RULES
<p>Correct: A suspect <u>who was armed and dangerous</u> was apprehended by an undercover police officer.</p> <p>Incorrect: A suspect was apprehended by an undercover police officer <u>who was armed and dangerous</u>. (This sentence means that the officer was armed and dangerous, but the writer wanted to communicate that the suspect was armed and dangerous.)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ■ An adjective clause must come after the word that it modifies, and nowhere else. ■ If it is put somewhere else, the sentence will be confusing.
